More opportunities for community outings	We agree that community outings and supporting the local community is really important for our children, and so we're always looking for ways to connect with our local community. This year, children will be taking part in events like the VE Day parade , our KS2 Choir will visit a local care home, and every class will plan a Community Action project in the summer term. We're also exploring Activity Week ideas with local groups. If you have suggestions, we'd love to hear them – do come and chat with us! If you can support Activity Week in any way, please let us know!
Offer swimming lessons	Swimming is part of the National Curriculum in KS2, so we ensure we cover this every year. All Key Stage 2 children are offered intensive swimming lessons during the summer term. We hire a pool exclusively for two weeks, giving pupils focused tuition to help them meet national curriculum expectations by the end of Year 6. We're proud to provide this opportunity – not many schools have access to a dedicated pool space, and we believe swimming is a vital life skill for all children.
More class assemblies and events similar to the iSingPop event	We know our children really enjoy performing and celebrating wider curriculum learning! Each class currently performs one class assembly per year. These are a great opportunity for children to share their learning, but do take time to prepare, so we limit them to ensure core learning isn't impacted. We're so pleased these assemblies are well supported by families! This year, events like iSingPop and the ' Bedworth, A Singing Town ' performances have been a huge success, and we're planning to repeat them next year. Our Year 4 and Year 5 pupils are also preparing for music performances in the summer term. Looking ahead, we're exploring an exciting new partnership with KICK Academy , which could offer children even more opportunities in dance, drama and musical theatre – so stay tuned for more performances next year!
More 'fun' events like end of term discos	We have loved seeing the joy on peoples faces at both the Christmas Disco and recent Easter Bingo events. We are planning a Summer term disco, and other 'fun' events like this in Activity Week in the Summer term. Mr Wagstaff regularly meets with pupil leaders to gather their ideas on how to enhance things even further.

<p>Stop asking for money for trips, and then cancelling trips</p>	<p>At All Saints, we're passionate about giving children experiences beyond the classroom, and we're proud that our personal development work has been recognised as 'outstanding'.</p> <p>We haven't cancelled a school trip since 2019, so we're unsure where this concern has come from. We always aim to offer enriching visits and workshops, but as school funding doesn't cover trips, we do need to ask for parental contributions to help make them happen. School do not profit from your contribution, so the only people missing out if trips have to be cancelled are the children!</p> <p>To support families, we subsidise 50% of the cost for children eligible for free school meals using our Pupil Premium funding. If a trip ever had to be cancelled, any payments would, of course, be fully refunded. The only reason we would have to cancel, is if parents did not support the event with their contributions.</p>
<p>Nursery to be more involved in main school events (e.g. Sports Day, Bun Day)</p>	<p>We love involving our Nursery children in whole-school life wherever we can! They do already take part in events like Bun Day, special assemblies, and buddy activities with older pupils.</p> <p>There are occasions where it may not be suitable – for example, long walks to events like Church services – as these can be a bit much for our youngest children.</p> <p>That said, our Nursery team is committed to making sure children have plenty of chances to join in with wider school events whenever possible.</p>
<p>Do not close Nursery for part days</p>	<p>We totally agree with this comment, and understand that closing Nursery for all or part of a day can cause issues for parents in terms of childcare. Therefore, we have minimised this as much as possible this year, and Nursery will only close when the rest of the site is closed to pupils, or when there are significant staff absences that can not be covered to ensure children's safety.</p>
